PETER CLARK

Peter brings a wealth of experience to the Quartet, having previously held the role of Principal Violin of Australia's Omega Ensemble, and first violinist of the Australian Chamber Orchestra's Inspire Quartet. He has performed on prestigious stages worldwide, including Los Angeles' Walt Disney Hall, the Sydney Opera House, and New York's Carnegie Hall, and has held the role of Concertmaster with renowned companies including New Zealand Opera, Victorian Opera, and Sydney Chamber Opera.

Peter is a committed advocate for the importance of music in society. He has performed in more than 130 regional towns and cities across Australia and developed a beloved music programme at Melbourne's Royal Children's Hospital. His research on social innovation and cohesion through music is generously supported by Judith Neilson AM, the General Sir John Monash Foundation, and the American Australian Association.

MONIQUE'S HIGHLIGHTS WITH THE NZSQ

2017

NZSQ collaborates with dancers of the Royal New Zealand Ballet and choreographer, Alexander Ekman, in a production of "Three by Ekman".

2020

The 250th anniversary of Beethoven's birth and a chance for the NZSQ to perform all of Beethoven's string quartets around New Zealand.

"Amongst the Covid-19 pandemic we found many opportunities to share music, including recording digital broadcasts of concerts, and carrying on our teaching our NZSM students online. With restrictions gradually relaxing, we eventually began to embark on socially distanced tours of Beethoven's string quartets. These were memorable moments for us and truly highlighted the importance and power of live music and art in all forms as a connecting force for humanity."

2023

PROGRAMME NOTES

Quintessence: An NZSQ Celebration

Friday 7 June, 6.30pm, Hunter Council Chamber

Johannes Brahms (1833–1897)

String Quartet No. 3 in B flat major, Op. 67 (1875)

I. Vivace

II. Andante

III. Agitato (Allegretto non troppo) – trio – coda

IV. Poco Allegretto con Variazioni

Brahms's contribution to chamber music was significant. In 1875, while holidaying in Ziegelhausen near Heidelberg, he completed the Piano Quartet, Op. 60, and began work on his final string quartet, the Quartet in B flat major, Op. 67. Published the following year, the latter was dedicated to Professor Theodor Wilhelm Engelmann, his host during a concert tour of Holland in January 1876. The first movement of the quartet starts with a cheerful theme that soon allows the intrusion of cross rhythms. The second subject, appearing after a transition that touches on the minor, is a happy dance tune, and these elements form the substance of the central development and subsequent recapitulation. The F major slow movement features an emotive melody for the first violin, with moments of drama and meter changes in the middle section. The muted D minor third movement, marked Agitato, showcases intense thematic material for the viola, leading into the A minor Trio before concluding gently in D major. The last movement brings a simple melody, followed by eight variations. The first of these is dominated by the viola, which starts the second variation. The third brings triplet figuration, the fourth a sombre opening for first violin and cello two octaves apart, the fifth a change of key to D flat major and the sixth a molto dolce G flat major. The seventh variation, in doubled speed, brings back the key and principal theme of the first movement, followed by a final variation that recalls the transitional material of the first movement, in B flat minor. The movement, the longest of the four, ends with a coda that combines elements of the seventh variation, and therefore the first movement, with the theme of the finale, a statement of perfect unity.



W.A. Mozart (1756–1791)

String Quintet No. 1 in B-flat major, K. 174 (1773)

I. Allegro moderato

II. Adagio

III. Menuetto ma Allegretto

IV. Allegro

This beautiful work is not as well-known as his quintets in g, D, C and E flat, which Mozart wrote quite late in his life. However, it is an astonishing product of a 17-year-old composer. Hallmarks of this piece are the lively conversational elements, use of varying duets of instruments, irregular phrase lengths and musical surprises which will have been quite radical for the time. The overall sense of good humour reaches its zenith in the Trio of the third movement, where the ongoing use of extreme echoes is almost at the level of Marx Brothers' slapstick. The heartfelt, muted Adagio second movement begins with a unison melody which cleverly reappears as accompanimental material, and it also features some exceptionally lovely second violin solos – apt for our occasion tonight!
